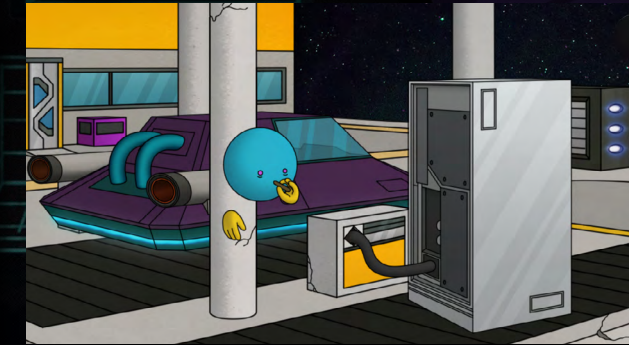
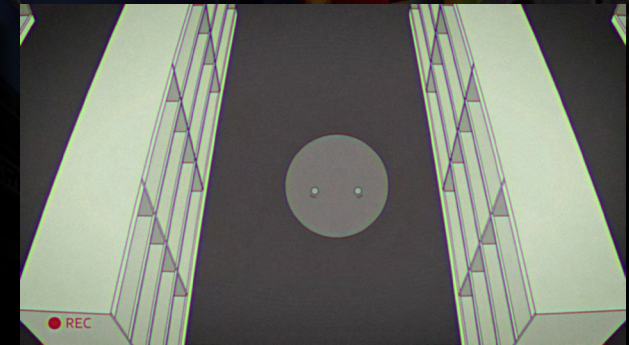

Edgy and free-spirited, She walks the line between loyalty and defiance. She sees through the chaos, yet it never lets her go.



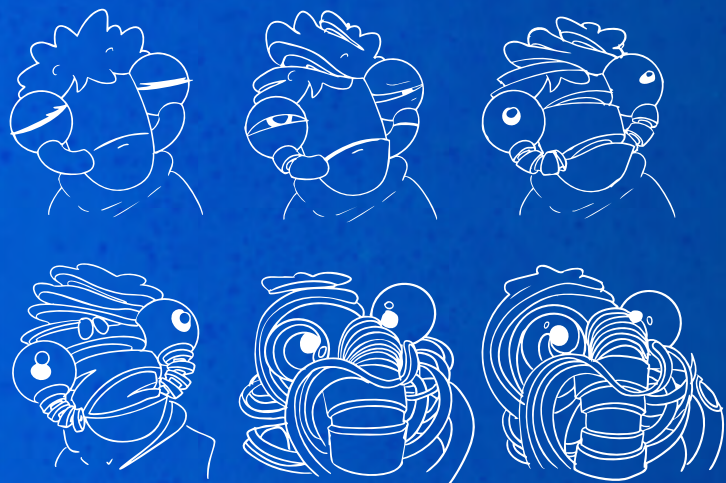
THE BOSS
